On a Winter's Night, All the Ice Came Down (1916)

In mid-winter, large white icicles, tens of feet long hang from the Indian Ladder cliffs. Some even form great continuous columns of ice, supported at their base by volcano-like ice formations. One night in the winter of 1916, in Thacher Park's second year, a great shaking brought much of

the ice tumbling down.

The first superintendent of Thacher Park was, fittingly, a geologist. You can read John Cook's writings on the caves and glacial history of the Helderbergs and broader region.

Recently historian Tim
Albright came across a geologically curious paragraph from
John Cook's monthly report for
February 1916. "An earth-quake
of sufficient violence to break off
all the larger icicles descending
from the cliff-edge was experienced on the night of Feb. 2nd but
so far as a hasty and superficial
examination showed, no rock
masses were loosened."

Some of you are aware that miles beneath the Helderbergs, the rocks occasionally shift, generating earthquakes. All of these "tremblors" we know of have been small (from less than 1 to 3.1 Magnitude), and occurred 3-15 miles below the surface. Surprisingly, over 90 of these small earthquakes have been recorded by seismometers since 1980, most of them too small to be felt. Small or not, the Helderbergs are one of the more "seismically active" locales in New York State.

As a geologist at the New York State Museum who lives in the Helderbergs, these earthquakes catch

my attention. John Cook's report of the Feb. 1916 quake left me wondering – could this mark the occurrence of an older Helderberg earthquake?

I contacted seismologists at Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory, who looked into

the older records. John Cook's 1916 earthquake was not in the Helderbergs. Felt widely through the Capital District-Saratoga region, this event was named the Schenectady Earthquake. The next day the New York Times reported shaking houses, broken windows, and shifting furniture, for 25 miles around. No major damage was reported, but at General Electric in Schenectady, the shaking was so vigorous that it was initially thought to be an explosion in the plant.

The Lamont-Doherty records show that on the night of February 2, 1916, there were two quakes in quick succession, at about 11:25p.m. They occurred at an

unknown depth, roughly between Schenectady and Ballston Spa. The estimated magnitude of the larger of the two was 3.8. A known fault runs through that area, from the east Adirondacks through Saratoga and Schenectady, approaching the Helderbergs – where it's never been found.

And so the mystery of John Cook's winter icefall event is solved. One more geological story from Thacher Park, one of New York's geological gems.

Restoration of Knox School #5 is Complete

The Kiwanis Club of the Helderbergs has completed restoration of a one-room schoolhouse (School #5) in Knox, NY. Located on the grounds of the Emma Treadwell Thacher Nature Center, the schoolhouse was built in the late 1890's. The schoolhouse is owned by New York State Department of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation and was restored under the guidance of Parks' Historic Sites Restoration Office. The building is now on the National Register of Historic Places.

A member of the Kiwanis Club, Pauline Williman, attended the school in the 1930's. Her recollections, and those of several other former School #5 students, provided details about the school that were helpful during the restoration. For example, the students were occasionally asked to apply linseed oil to the Douglas fir flooring. Several of the teachers in the early 1900's lived with Pauline's family, so she was able to provide interesting details about the teachers. The photo above shows Pauline in the restored schoolhouse, along with Fred Schroeder, a former member of the Friends of Thacher State Park, who urged that the schoolhouse be restored.

The foundation, sill plates and floor joists were in such bad shape that the building had to be jacked-up so the foundation could be rebuilt. One Kiwanis member, the late Rudy Stempel, owned a saw-mill and was able to provide custom sill plates and floor joists. The photo below shows two more Kiwanis members, John Elberfeld and Homer Warner, standing before the schoolhouse, getting ready to do some final interior restoration.

To complete the project, we have now produced a book about the schoolhouse. The book, "History of a One-room Schoolhouse in Knox, NY", includes information about the restoration and a summary of interviews with former students. The book, written by Dan



Driscoll with a forward by Jack McEneny, includes a transcript of School Board minutes for School District #5 from 1824 thru 1905 along with a description of contemporary historic events (such as the Anti-rent Wars) to provide context. Copies of the book can be purchased on-line from Lulu.com; proceeds go to Friends of Thacher State Park.
