Winter is for the Birds!

As I write this, the wind is howling outside and the latest cold front, the Siberian Express, is moving in for another deep freeze. But, let us divert ourselves with some bird talk . . .

This winter Thacher Park has been involved in a survey of wintering golden eagles. In New York, golden eagles are listed as endangered and rarely seen. The eastern North American population breeds in Canada and a small part of this population winters in New York. Camera traps are being used by researchers to learn more about these golden eagles. Our local Audubon chapter requested permission to set up and monitor a baited camera trap in Thacher Park. We are happy to support the project and got permission to also set up one of the Friends' trail cameras at the site. Audubon volunteer Angelika Beckmann is managing our site, replenishing the "bait" (deer carcasses supplied by DOT), and submitting photos to the research group. An animal carcass attracts scavengers, including ravens, which are common in the Helderbergs, and the noisy ravens attract hawks and eagles to the feast. We have not yet caught a golden eagle on camera, but there have been lots of ravens and several red-tailed hawks feeding on the carcass. Unfortunately there have been far fewer sightings of golden eagles this winter, according to the head researcher, apparently due to the extreme cold. (Even the birds are fed up.)

Surprisingly, however, our local bald eagle has been seen regularly near Thompson's Lake this winter. Commonly bald eagles move down along the Hudson in winter, where they can still find some open water for fishing. On a recent

train ride to NYC, I counted at least 10 adult bald eagles along the partially frozen river searching for prey. While we've seen bald eagles on the lake regularly in the summer for quite a few years, this is the first time we've had sightings all through the winter months. (Now why haven't those ravens lured that eagle up to our trail cameras?) We do know at least one source of food, as one cold morning I witnessed the eagle swooping down to grab a fish off the frozen lake, placed there by ice fishermen. That was an easy meal.

We've also been surprised by the sight of a song sparrow and a small flock of starlings at the feeder in early February. It really has been a crazy winter - "for the birds", I'm sure you agree. Ah, but very soon it will be March and the red-winged blackbirds will come back to announce the coming of spring!! I will hold that thought as I listen to the bitter winds blowing outside.

Park and the Thacher Nature Center. As of mid-February we have raised almost \$3,000. Our goal is to raise \$3,500, so if you have not had a chance to donate yet please consider making a donation. Each \$5 donation allows an additional student to come to the park and experience nature. See the form on the last page for information on how to donate.

Using the funds we raised last year, 20 buses and 720 already begun. kids visited the park. For many children this is the first experience in the woods. Some children express fear and reluctance to enter the woods. But once they venture in, with the help of the Nature Center staff and interns, they quickly lose their fear and become curious about their surroundings. One highlight last year was a chance to view a mother turkey and her chicks in a nest in the woods, some-

thing many of us who regularly visit the woods have never had a chance to see. In addition, some kids got the opportunity to see the bald eagle that has been sighted at Thompson's Lake for the past few years.

Within the Nature Center, some children express strong dislike for bees, and they have little or no interest in viewing the hive. But as the instructors begin to explain what is going on in the hive, they move a bit closer and often end up being drawn in and asking questions about the hive. All of these experiences help to change their initial fear of nature to a curiosity we hope will grow with them throughout their lives. We hope for some of the children this is the beginning of a lifelong connection with nature. For others it helps strengthen a connection they have already begun.


